

Degree Requirements for the Master of Music degree in  
*CHORAL CONDUCTING*

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The degree requires the completion of 30 credit hours, including AM 710 (Conducting Recital), which consists of a full recital (60 minutes of music) or two half-recitals (30 minutes of music on each). A DVD recording of the final recital(s), along with the completed recital grading form(s) and two copies of the printed program(s), must be submitted to the Director of Graduate Studies following completion of the recital(s). The DVD and programs will be placed in the collection of the University library. This must be completed before the degree will be conferred.

A final comprehensive oral examination (AM 799) covering the entire program of study is required at the end of the program (after the successful recital or two half-recitals).

The Graduate Music Diagnostic Exams in music theory, music history, and diction are required for placement purposes. Depending on the results of these exams, students may be required to take review coursework (MH 508, Graduate Music History Review; MT 508, Graduate Music Theory Review; ML 508, Graduate Lyric Diction Review; and/or other remedial coursework). These review classes count as General Music Electives only.
